2011 REPORT TO THE LOCAL ASSOCIATION

Congregational Ministries exists to serve as a response system to our local churches. As such we do as much as possible to stay connected with each church so that we can better address the variety of needs in those churches.

Conferences and events are an important part of this response system. Congregational Ministries coordinates many of the training events at our annual Missions & Ministry Summit while also sponsoring the National Youth Conference and the Senior Adult Retreat. Attendance continues to grow at the Summit and the department continues to aid in contract negotiations, meeting planning activity and registration. The National Youth Conference will move back to Carlinville, IL this summer with a three day programming event that will challenge and equip our teens June 24-26. The Senior Adult Retreat enjoyed record attendance last fall and will meet again in Branson September 6-8.

Coaching and training allows Congregational Ministries to meet a variety of needs in a variety of local churches. Currently three coaching networks are meeting under the sponsorship of the department and several other formal and informal groups have begun meeting as well. Next Level Coaching led by Pastor Clint Cook currently connects with leaders from 30 churches in two networks. A pilot project of with evening sessions has begun under the leadership of Franklin Dumond. Next Level Coaching continues to profile best practices that can be used by congregations to enhance their effectiveness and accelerate their growth.

Next Level Training continues to provide a general introduction for local church leaders to understand their mission, identify their life cycle and learn about essential systems in each local church. This training is available in a three or four session format with each session separated by a few weeks to allow church leaders to begin implementation of one set of lessons prior to beginning a new set of lessons.

Specialized training is currently available in three areas:

1. Mission One and My Church. This training provides an overview of the Mission One initiative along with practical training to bring the Mission One emphasis to the local church.
2. Making My Teaching More Effective. This workshop provides an important review and/or introduction to teaching/learning styles and to simple teaching techniques that can be applied with any curriculum.

3. Discipleship Classes in the Local Church. This workshop surveys the content, suggests the organization, and profiles the necessity of simple discipleship/membership classes in the local church.

Consulting services are also available to address:

1. Church Health and Readiness for Change. This level of consultation is especially helpful for churches that recognize a need to refocus and revitalize their ministries.

2. Developing a Ministry Action Plan (MAP). This level of consultation is especially helpful for churches and church related organizations that see the need to develop a strategic plan and/or begin a new ministry.

3. Legacy Church. Occasionally churches, like other organizations, complete their life cycles and must come to terms with how to transfer assets and ministries with dignity, in keeping with the original purpose of the church. Legacy church consultation is done within the guidelines established by the Council of Associations.

“Strange as it may seem, preaching—one anointed person speaking a fresh word from God amid the people of God—is one of the Father’s favorite ways of communicating His will to believers” (H. B. London, Jr., and Neil B. Wiseman, p. 25).

This gives insight as to why Paul instructs churches in caring for their pastors.

“Let the elders that rule well be counted worthy of double honour, especially they who labour in the word and doctrine. For the scripture saith, Thou shalt not muzzle the ox that treadeth out the corn. And, The labourer is worthy of his reward” (I Timothy 5:17-18).

It is a privilege and awesome responsibility to serve the pastoral leaders among General Baptists.

The assistance Pastoral Ministries (P.M.) gives to churches in need of a pastor has proven to be beneficial. Printed material and guidance is provided for these churches. An up-to-date Church Opening List is maintained on the General Baptist website. Assistance is given to ministers who are available for pastoral leadership positions.

Those interested in a pastoral position may send their resumes to the P.M. department. When requested by ministers, confidentiality is maintained.

LAMP, Leaders Advancing in Ministry Program, is an educational opportunity provided by P.M. This program is to assist presbyteries/ordaining councils by providing ministerial training for those called into the ministry. It is also used in equipping deacons and other church leaders for their work. The three levels of LAMP are 100 Leadership Development, 200 Biblical Leadership Development, and 300 Pastoral Leadership Development. As of this report there are 129 active students in LAMP. In 2010, 17 completed Level 100, 8 completed Level 200, and 6 received the Certificate of Pastoral Ministries by completing all levels. P.M. leads and sponsors workshops at the annual General Baptist Mission & Ministry (M & M) Summit. In preparing for the “Year of Prayer, Fasting, and Reconciliation” for 2011, P.M. sponsored a workshop on reconciliation at the 2010 M & M. Peacemakers Ministries offered guidance and resources on the biblical process in resolving conflict. It has produced a DVD-based eight-lesson study on biblical peacemaking. This study is available on loan from the P.M. department.

P.M. provides scholarships for pastors who have never attended an M & M Summit. Churches and associations are encouraged to provide scholarships for pastors. These can be given in memory or honor of pastors who have or are serving in the association. For information in how to establish these scholarships, contact the P.M. department.

Good financial stewardship in a church includes maintaining an up-to-date compensation package for its pastor/pastors. Annually, a compensation information packet is mailed out to churches from the P.M. office. Churches are encouraged to do an annual review of their compensation packages. The P.M. office provides information for churches in establishing such benefits as housing allowances, accountable reimbursement plans, and other benefits acceptable by IRS regulations.

P.M. encourages churches to observe Pastor and Spouse Appreciation in October and provides ideas for honoring a pastor/pastors and family/families.

The 2011 Ministers’ Conference is May 31-June 2 at Stone Castle Hotel & Conference Center in Branson, Missouri. This year’s guest speaker is John Ed Mathison, keynote speaker at the 2009 M & M Summit. Details can be found by going to www.GeneralBaptist.com. encouragement to pastors and their spouses when churches provide the financial support for these conferences.

Anyone familiar with leadership knows one of the greatest challenges is to find it, nurture it, and recreate it. This year GBIM will be laying the groundwork for the development of indigenous pastors through intentional training events and resourcing of our various fields that need to be strengthened. We will do this through seminars, Bible helps, teachings, and online resources where possible. If you know of anyone who would like to participate in these training events, please contact the mission for more information.

In keeping with organizational goals, GBIM is developing strategies for church planting and evangelism, leadership development, and the long term health of our churches overseas. This is an area that needs to be held up with a lot of prayer. Any planning done will be achieved with direct consultation and integration of national leaders in our various fields.

During 2010, we saw the successful startup of our internship program at GBIM. We are providing opportunities for college students to spend from 1 month to 6 months overseas in an internship program. Working with OCU, we plan on offering college credit were it is appropriate. This year we will be looking to expand this program for more students to experience missions.

Since the earthquake at Faith Home, the mission has been trying to rebuild cottages as funds are available. This year we plan on rebuilding one cottage at a cost of approximately \$45,000. Please pray for needed funds to continue the renovations. We are also looking at ways to make Faith Home more self sufficient by exploring opportunities with ministries like Feed The Children and Samaritan's Purse. Please pray for providential meetings and opportunities to expand ministry where possible at Faith Home.

It has been said that there is a shortage of young people going into full time ministry, the pastorate, and the mission field. Please continue to pray that people will be open to ministry where ever it may be. We could always use more laborers .

Please pray for continued faithful support of missionaries and ministries during this difficult financial time that our country is in.

We would like to remind everyone that World Missions Sunday will be on September the 18th this year. It will be divided between construction at Faith Home and leadership development on our other fields.

We would like to express our gratitude to everyone who has graciously given, packed, and sacrificed concerning the containers sent to Faith Home. This year, we plan on sending another container in August.

This year we will be offering short term mission opportunities to Honduras, Jamaica, Saipan, the Philippines, and the Congo. If you are interested, please contact Johnny.jourdan@generalbaptists.com

God really blessed General Baptist National Missions in 2010 with the successful launching of two churches. Relevant Church in Locust Grove, Georgia, led by Carl Nichols has been our fastest growing church plant ever. It is averaging 241 in attendance and has seen 112 people give their lives to Christ! It has also been able to include 120 volunteers in weekly service/ministry.

Kris Freeman launched Revolution Church in White House, Tennessee. His church has also seen tremendous growth. It is averaging 145 in attendance and has seen 31 souls saved, 19 baptized, and over 90 people in Connect Groups. Revolution Church is also leading in missions by organizing an MVP trip to Jamaica this summer to assist our GB pastors who faithfully labor on the island.

Rev. Don Key has been recommended by the Personnel Committee to serve as National Missions Director. Following affirmation by the Executive Council he has begun work as an interim director pending formal approval by the Council of Associations in May.

We successfully “stuck with it” for 100 years, rallying women in support of General Baptist Mission projects. Like any other organization, some of those years were banner years and some...well...not so much. But ALWAYS we have succeeded in joining together to fund major mission projects, and not-so-major but just as important mission field needs.

We are expected to depend on God to be the one who orchestrates our success, and we are expected to celebrate when those successes are obvious.  On March 9 and again on July 20 General Baptists throughout the world will be asked to set aside special times for prayer and fasting. Along with the emphasis on a prayer vigil on March 9, the Mission One Planning Team has prepared a devotional booklet to be used during the 40 days leading up to Easter.

Every church will be encouraged to determine if this vigil is to be a personal or a corporate event. A personal prayer event encourages private, individual prayer while a corporate prayer event emphasizes a gathering of a small or large group to pray together.

Each of these prayer movements shows up in the Scriptures, and both have been used with great effect throughout the history of the church.

Both individual and collective vigils may address the same themes and elements in prayer. In actual practice a combination of the two may work best to include as many people as possible in the prayer ministry of the local church. Thus a prayer guide used for a corporate prayer meeting that is also shared with individuals who cannot attend the meeting involves more folks than would be included if only one option were pursued.

Prayer guides that can easily be customized with special features that relate to the local church ministry and with updated information from denominational offices are included in Section 2 of the “Mission One Plan Book”.

Another year has passed and so much has changed in just twelve months. We have a new Executive Director, Dr. Jim Murray. The has been suspended until the launch of a new format in July and the direction of the General Baptist movement has changed. We here at Stinson Press are excited about the opportunities we have to reach more people for Christ in the years ahead. Be praying for another great awakening in our churches and our country.

As I shared at the last Council of Associations, we must work on helping parents win and disciple their own kids. We are placing a major emphasis on biblical parenting. 2011 REPORT TO LOCAL ASSOCIATIONS

Dear Council of Associations:

The Oakland City University family stands amazed by God's continued blessings. He has honored our commitment to be a Christian faith-based learning community that is preparing students for service. In the fall of 2010, Oakland City University experienced another record breaking enrollment of 2,696 students.

The mission of the University is fulfilled through our emphasis on the Head, the Heart, and the Hands. Consequently, our vision for Oakland City University is that we offer a

holistic education. Since 1885, our motto has been “Enter to Learn, Go Forth to Serve”. On a daily basis, our faculty instills the idea of service in our students.

Perhaps, some of our best stories over the course of last year came from two December 2010 graduates, Whitney Goostree and A.J. Ford. Both students traveled to Faith Home through a University sponsored mission trip. Whitney recalls:

“I thought I had prepared myself, but in all reality, there is really no way to prepare yourself unless you have seen it before. My simple prayer was for God to truly break me. What I mean by that is I wanted Him to break me for the people of Honduras and humble me to the point where I realize how big God is and how small I am. God had planned the week out so perfectly and revealed Himself to me piece by piece. It was truly a life changing experience that is indescribable and I encourage everyone to just get out there and be the hands and feet of Jesus to all nations. Because that is what we are called to do!

A.J. Ford, a Business Administration major, found God’s calling on his life through serving others. A.J. recalls:

“God has changed me. I had always wondered what I was going to do after college. Through the mission trip to Faith Home, I realized God has plans for me in the mission field. In January 2011, I will be returning to Honduras to work full-time. I thank the Lord for this opportunity to serve others and truly give my life to sharing the love of Jesus.”

Oakland City University has made it a priority for every student organization to be involved in service projects to the local community, the nation, and beyond. During the spring break of 2011, numerous OCU students will assist the poor and needy at the Nashville Rescue Mission in Nashville, Tennessee. Our students plan to continue the collaborations started by the 2010 General Baptist Summit. In addition, the team will be working with Revolution Church, a General Baptist church plant, in Whitehouse, Tennessee.

. General Baptist Health Care, Piggott, AR. is a non-profit health care corporation which serves as the corporate office for four facilities. General Baptist Health Care currently operates General Baptist Nursing Home, a skilled facility in Campbell, MO; Oakview Heights Continuous Care, a skilled facility in Mt. Carmel, IL; and Oakview Villa, an assisted living in Mt. Carmel, IL. A new facility, Magnolia Manor, an assisted living was opened in November of this year.

- Since we have a full time CPA on staff, we are generating financials for each of our healthcare facilities from the corporate office. Medicaid, Medicare, and HUD cost reports continue to be prepared by contracted CPA firms, as well as the year end audits.
- We have a billing specialist on staff who is doing the Medicaid, Medicare, Insurance and any other billing needs for each of our facilities.
- Purchasing is done from corporate for each facility by the Purchasing Agent. This will help keep a track of each facility's inventories.
- MDI Achieve's Online Advantage software includes Human Resources Center, Payroll, Touch Time and Schedule Pro, Benefits Manager, and MDI Achieve General Ledger.
- Approximately 300 full and part time staff, consultants, therapy department, and medical directors in the General Baptist Health Care Ministry.
- 254 licensed and certified beds.

Is a 90 bed skilled care facility, with a staff of 100 to 125 full and part time employees.

- Medicaid and Medicare licensed and certified.
- Full time therapy department with in-house and outpatient services.
- Certified Nurses Aide classes taught on campus.
- New generator will run 100% of the facility power in the event the city power source is out of service.
- Shopping spree for residents. This way every resident receives something for Christmas.

- The first and only assisted living facility in Clay County, Arkansas.
- New staff hired and trained.
- First tenants to be admitted were a married couple in their eighties.
- Approved as a Medicaid provider.
